MIAL CELEBRATES MISSISSIPPI'S ARTISTS, MUSICIANS, AND WRITERS

In 1978 Noel Polk and Aubrey Lucas invited Governor William Winter, Cora Norman, Keith Dockery McLean, and other distinguished Mississippians to join them in forming the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters. These founding members knew that among Mississippi's greatest riches are our artists, writers, and musicians, who must be supported, nurtured, and recognized.

The prestigious awards, first made in 1980, are presented in seven categories: Fiction, Nonfiction, Visual Art, Musical Composition, Photography, and Poetry. (Early awards were made in three categories only: Literature, Music, and Art.) At the discretion of the Board of Governors, a special, lifetime, or career achievement award may also be given. Winners must be current Mississippi residents or have significant ties to the state. Recipients are awarded cash prizes and Mississippi-made gifts.

The Institute's juried competition is one of a kind in the state. Our carefully selected judges, chosen from out of state, are prominent in their fields. MIAL is privately funded, self-perpetuating, and nonprofit.

Each annual awards gala, hosted by various cities around the state, is unique. Among past highlights was a 1983 banquet theme based on Aristophanes's *The Frogs*, a satiric literary competition. Another year, the Muses were the theme, based on a logo created

In 2002 Walter Anderson's intricate flora and fauna painted on the walls of the Ocean Springs Civic Center served as a backdrop for violinist Michael Kimber, that year's winner for Musical Composition. In 2003 a festive brunch was held at historic Fairview Inn in Jackson. In honor of the Institute's Silver Anniversary Celebration in 2004, all past winners, along with current winners, were recognized and feted at palatial Stanton Hall in Natchez. A highlight of the 30th Anniversary Award Banquet, in Laurel, was the opening of an exhibition featuring MIAL Award winters in Visual Art and Photography over the past 30 years. This exhibition was on view throughout the summer of

2009 at the Lauren Rogers Museum of Art and was a virtual Who's Who of Mississippi artists.

In accepting her 2003 Poetry award, Natasha Trethewey eloquently expressed the sentiments of many winners. "Today, I am so delighted by this honor," she said, "because I know that it means you have welcomed me back home as daughter. I'm lucky to be from Mississippi, and I write because I want to make sense of and tell a fuller story of our rich and troubled past."

The list of past award recipients is a strong reflection of the talents of Mississippians and the artistic heritage of our state.

Judges will consider only work shown, published, or performed in the previous year. Members may nominate more than one individual in any category. Nominations should include place and date of birth. Only MIAL members may nominate.

DEADLINE: Nominations must be postmarked on or before January 15. Attach the artist's representative work (slides, photographs, CDs, books, etc.). Please mail the nomination to the appropriate address according to the awards category entered.
