## 2016 Award Winners Honored

The Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters (MIAL) honored its award winners for works first published, performed, or shown in the year 2015 at the MIAL annual Awards Banquet held in the Grand Hall of the Mississippi Museum of Art in Jackson, Mississippi, on June 11, 2016. Readings and signings by award winners took place at Lemuria Bookstore in Jackson on the afternoon of June 11.

The Noel Polk Lifetime Achievement Awards this year go to William Baggett and Ron Dale. William Baggett, Professor Emeritus of Art and Design at the University of Southern Mississippi, has an illustrious career as a painter, muralist, and color lithographer. With two degrees in art from Auburn University, Baggett taught in university art and design programs for thirty-nine years. He has been featured in numerous exhibitions and publications; and his paintings and printmaking works are included in collections throughout the United States, Europe, and Japan. His work is also included in the U.S. Embassies Overseas Collection overseen by the U.S. Information Agency. From 1980-1995 Baggett worked with French and American art publishers in the execution of fifteen original print editions. Baggett created three monumentally-scaled figurative murals for the Library of Hattiesburg, the Winfred L. Wiser Hospital for Women and Children at the University of Mississippi Medical Center, and the auditorium for the Jule Collins Smith Museum of Fine Art at Auburn University. In 2014, William Baggett was the recipient of the Governor's Award in Visual Art presented by the Mississippi Arts Commission for career achievement. He maintains studios in Mississippi and Maine.

Ron Dale, a leading figure in contemporary American ceramics art, also received the Noel Polk Lifetime Achievement Award. Dale holds a B.F.A from Goddard College and an M.F.A from Louisiana State University and is Professor Emeritus at the University of Mississippi. His work has been featured in 26 solo exhibitions and in almost 100 group exhibitions and has won numerous awards, including the MIAL Award for the Visual Arts. His ceramic art follows two paths: one making dinnerware, trays, vases and bowls; and one using clay and wood to create multidimensional sculptures. He explains these paths: "My sculptural work has evolved out of the traditional vocabulary of the vessel. Dale pays homage to the Mississippi potter George Ohr in his important work, Is This My Graceland? Dale has also taught courses at Penland School of Crafts in North Carolina; at Blackhills Pottery in Elgin, Scotland; and in Cortona, Italy. He owns and runs Irondale Studio in Oxford, Mississippi.

Taylor Kitchings is this year's winner of the MIAL Fiction Award for his novel Yard War. Kitchings received his undergraduate degree from Rhodes College and his M.A. from the University of Mississippi. A musician and songwriter as well as author, Kitchings teaches English and Creative Writing at St. Andrew's Episcopal School in Jackson. Yard War, a young adult novel, is his first book and is set in Jackson in 1964. It tells the story of a twelve-year-old boy who encounters racial prejudice for the first time. The novel was chosen as a 2015 Junior Literary Guild Selection.

Winner of the Nonfiction Award is Joseph T. Reiff for Born of Conviction: White Methodists and Mississippi's Closed Society. Born in Jackson, Mississippi, Reiff holds a B.A. From Millsaps College, the M.Div. from the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, and the Ph.D. from Emory. He is currently department chair and Floyd Bunyan Shelton Professor of Religion at Emory and Henry College in Emory, Virginia. Combining memoir and biography, Reiff's book tells the history and the aftermath of the "Born of Conviction" statement signed

by 28 white Methodist pastors and published in the Mississippi Methodist Advocate on January 2, 1963.

R. Flowers Rivera, a Mississippi native, is the winner of the Poetry Award for her collection Heathen. This collection "melds classical myth and modern living" and stands as "a metaphor for how the disparate ages assembled here are more alike than we realized," according to Mitchell L.H. Douglas, this year's poetry judge. The poet herself refers to Heathen as "revisionist mythology." The book also won the 2015 Naomi Long Madgett Poetry Prize. Dr. Rivera holds a B.S. from the University of Georgia, an M.S. from Georgia State University, an M.A. from Hollins University, and a Ph.D. from Binghamton-SUNY.

Chosen for the Visual Arts Award is Martha Ferris, a Mississippian who grew up on her family farm out from Vicksburg and studied at Lake Forest College near Chicago. She wins the award for her exhibit Foreign and Familiar Places: Paintings by Martha Ferris, a 2015 exhibit at Fischer Galleries. These works display her love of exacting geometry and vivid colors and illustrate her response to cities far around the world and to places as close as her family farm. She is a mixed media artist committed to continuous experimentation and has done paintings on steel, paper, wood, canvas, and clayboard and created three-dimensional Blues Boxes, mosaic splash pools, and large murals.

Maude Schuyler Clay is the Photography Award winner for Mississippi History, a collection of color portraits of Mississippians. As Richard Ford wrote in his foreword to the book, "Clay's photographs are especially human-in their subject matter, and in the photographer's insistence that we be moved by art to look closely, and that photographs are good when they are as complex as we are." A native of Sumner, Mississippi, Clay studied at the University of Mississippi and the Memphis Academy of Arts. She worked for the photographer William Eggleston and also as a photography editor and photographer for Esquire, Vanity Fair, and Oxford American. She has previously won the MIAL Photography Award.

The winner of the Music Composition (Classical) Award is Samuel Jones for his Concerto for Violin and Orchestra. A native of Inverness, Mississippi, and a graduate of Millsaps, Jones holds the M.A. and Ph.D. from the Eastman School of Music. He is a past president of the Conductors' Guild and the founding dean of the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University. He also served as Composer in Residence of the Seattle Symphony Orchestra for fourteen years. A Grammy nominee, he is a winner of the MIAL award multiple times. Judge Quinton Morris describes Jones' concerto as "...the perfect blend of pain and pleasure and delight and discomfort. This is a piece that I hope eventually makes its way into the standard violin repertoire."

Mac McAnally is the winner of the Music Composition (Popular) Award for AKA Nobody. This Mississippi musician has won the CMA Musician of the Year award for an unprecedented eight years in a row and is in the Nashville Songwriters' Hall of Fame and the Mississippi Musicians Hall of Fame. Judge Steve Markland says of McAnally's winning work, "Mac's album, AKA Nobody, is nearly a perfect well-crafted album from start to finish. This would be the album I would give to aspiring writer artists to study the craft of songwriting."

#### Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters Award Nomination

MIAL members are encouraged to make nominations to honor the artistic achievements of living Mississippians (current residents or former ones with continuing, significant ties to the state). Judges will consider only work shown, published, or performed in **2016**. Members may nominate more than one individual in any category. Nominations should include place and date of birth. Please make additional copies of this form if needed.

#### Only MIAL members may nominate.

#### Award Categories:

**VISUAL ARTS** (painting, sculpture, drawing, print, graphic arts, etc.) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual pieces, first publicly shown or published in 2016. Submit CD, slides, prints, or published work.

**PHOTOGRAPHY** (color, black and white, combination) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual photographs, first publicly shown or published in 2016. Submit CD, slides, prints, or published work.

**FICTION** (novel, short story collection, etc.) Eligible is work first published in 2016. Submit author's name, publisher, title of publication, and date of publication.

**NONFICTION** (any literature that is not fictional) Eligible is work first published in 2016. Submit author's name, publisher, title of publication, and date of publication.

**POETRY** Eligible are up to 15 poems published individually for the first time in 2016, or a collection of at least 15 poems published in book form for the first time in 2016 (poems in the collection may have been first published earlier than 2016). Submit complete tear sheets or publication.

**MUSIC COMPOSITION—CLASSICAL** (song, opera, composition, instrumental music, etc.) This award is for works first published or performed publicly in 2016. Submit evidence of initial performance or publication (MP3 preferred. Or book, CD, tape, score) in 2016.

**MUSIC COMPOSITION—CONTEMPORARY** (blues, country music, jazz, rock, etc.) Submit published scores or the commercial recording first released in 2016. (Songs in a collection may have been 1<sup>st</sup> published earlier than 2016.)

**Deadline:** Nominations must be postmarked on or before **January 15, 2017**. Attach the artist's representative work (slides, photographs, CD's, etc.). Please mail the nomination to the appropriate address according to the awards category entered or e-mail to **ms.arts.letters@gmail.com**.
