MIAL ANNUAL AWARDS BANQUET

The Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters honored winners at the annual awards banquet on June 2, 2018. The banquet was held at the Two Mississippi Museums in Jackson, Mississippi. Master of Ceremonies for the evening was Bill Ellison, host of the popular Mississippi Public Broadcasting program "Grassroots", as well as Corporate Relations Manager for the MPB Foundation.

Noel Polk Lifetime Achievement Awards went to Robert Ivy and Andrew Cary Young. Robert Ivy, a native of Columbus, Mississippi, is Executive Vice President


and CEO of the American Institute of Architects. A graduate of the University of the South and of Tulane University, he shares the designation Master Architect with such iconic figures as Mies van der Rohe and I.M. Pei. He is one of only seven architects to receive this designation from the national architecture fraternity, Alpha Rho Chi, in its one-hundred year history. Ivy is also the author of the definitive biography of Fay Jones entitled *Fay Jones: Architect*. Prior to joining AIA, Ivy was Editor-in-Chief of

the journal *Architectural Record*. This journal received the National Magazine Award for General Excellence under his leadership. AIA President Carl Elefante said of Ivy, "As the CEO of AIA since 2011, and as author, editor, and practicing architect, Robert Ivy is a worthy ambassador for our profession. This award comes as a crowning personal and professional achievement for him as a native of Mississippi."

Andrew Cary Young is the President and Chief Designer of Pearl River Glass Studio which he founded in 1975. Young is the

lead designer and artist for this acclaimed stained glass in





this acclaimed studio and is considered a forerunner in stained glass innovation, pioneering such techniques as fused glass in leaded windows and the use of acid etching in new and modern ways. A resident of Jackson and a graduate of Louisiana State University, he also studied with Ludwig Schaffrath, H.G. Von Stockhausen, and the master iconographer Vladislav Andrejev. Young is a Mississippi Art Commission grantee and also the winner

in 2002 of the Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts.

His studio is an accredited member of the Stained Glass Association of America, and he recently finished a two-year term as president of that organization. Young has also served as president of the board of the Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi. A painter, as well as a glass artist, he has shown his mixed media paintings of figure drawings at the Fischer Galleries in Jackson.

The Institute presented a Special Achievement Award to *The Mississippi Encyclopedia* published by the University Press of Mississippi and sponsored by the Center for the Study of Southern Culture. Senior Editors are Ted Own by and Charles Reagan Wilson. Associate Editors are Ann J. Abadie, Odie Lindsey, and James G. Thomas, Jr. The massive volume is a

collaboration in which topics were suggested by thirty subject editors and entries were written by over seven hundred scholars. Dr. Stuart Rockoff, executive director of the Mississippi Humanities Council, states, "This book is amazing. I love that it's written by scholars. The encyclopedia pulls together in one place the historical and cultural significance of our state." The breadth of coverage and the depth of scholarship make this book a unique contribution to the understanding of Mississippi.

AWARD CATEGORY WINNERS

- **Michael Knight**, a professor of creative writing at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, was this year's fiction winner for *Eveningland*, a collection of thematically-linked stories set around Mobile Bay. Knight earned an MA from University of Southern Mississippi.
- The Nonfiction Award went **John T. Edge**, Oxford, for *The Potlikker Papers: A Food History of the Modern South*. Edge is the founding director of the Southern Foodways Alliance, at the Center for the Study of Southern Culture at the University of Mississippi.
- **Molly McCully Brown** was the winner of the Poetry Award for her book *The Virginia State Colony for Epileptics and Feebleminded: Poems.* Brown earned an MFA from the University of Mississippi.
- The winner of the Music Composition (Classical) Award was James Sclater, Clinton, for his winning piece, No Fairer
 Isle on Which to Dwell, which he dedicated to the memory of his wife, Judy. Sclater is retired faculty from Mississippi
 College.
- The Music Composition (Contemporary) Award went to **Shannon McNally** of Holly Springs for *Black Irish*, her eighth album. McNally studied anthropology at Franklin and Marshall College before beginning her musical career.
- **Charlie Buckley** of Tupelo was the winner of the Visual Arts Award for *Charlie Buckley-Recent Paintings*. Buckley graduated from the University of Mississippi and has taught art at Miami University, Mississippi State University, and the University of Mississippi.
- The Photography Award winner was **Jack Spencer** of Nashville, Tennessee, for *This Land: An American Portrait*. Spencer, a self-taught photographer, spent his early years in Kosciusko and attended Louisiana Tech University.

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Guests enjoyed a lovely reception prior to the awards banquet.

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








Stunning award gifts, designed by Elizabeth Robinson from kiln-formed glass and featuring the MIAL logo, were presented to each of the winners.

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Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters Award Nomination MIAL members are encouraged to make nominations to honor the artistic achievements of living Mississippians (current residents or former ones with continuing, significant ties to the state). Judges will consider only work shown, published, or performed in that calendar year (January-December). Members may nominate more than one individual in any category. Please make additional copies of this form if needed. Nominations should include a complete address or e-mail, if applicable. Children's books, cookbooks, edited works, and self-published works cannot be considered. All nominations are subject to board approval.

ONLY MIAL MEMBERS MAY NOMINATE.

Award Categories:

POETRY

VISUAL ARTS (painting, sculpture, drawing, print, graphic arts, etc.) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual pieces. Submit CD, slides, prints, or published work.

PHOTOGRAPHY (color, black and white, combination) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual photographs. Submit CD, website link, slides, prints, or published work.

FICTION (novel, short story collection, etc.)

NONFICTION (any literature that is not fictional)

POETRY Eligible are up to 15 poems published individually or in a collection (some poems in the collection may have been published earlier). Submit complete tear sheets or publication.

MUSIC COMPOSITION CLASSICAL (song, opera, composition, instrumental music, etc.) Submit evidence of initial performance or publication (MP3 preferred, but also book, CD, tape, score).

MUSIC COMPOSITION CONTEMPORARY (blues, country music, jazz, rock, etc.) Submit the commercial recording. At least five original compositions must be presented.

Deadline: Nominations must be postmarked on or before **January 15**. Attach the artist's representative work (books, slides, photographs, CD's, etc.). Please send the nomination to the appropriate category chair listed below.

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
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MARK YOUR CALENDARS
