The 2021 Noel Polk Lifetime Achievement Award winner: Rea Hederman

A native of Jackson, Mississippi, Rea Hederman has been publisher of The New York Review of Books since 1984.

Hederman earned degrees at Mississippi College, the University of Virginia and the University of Missouri. After working as editor for a weekly newspaper in Canton, Mississippi, he served as city and then managing editor of the Clarion-Ledger and became executive editor in 1980. Under his leadership, the paper turned

away from its conservative roots to execute "one of the most dramatic turnarounds in American journalism," according to the Washington Post.

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Award Winners

(Pictured above, top row, left to right)

- Andrea Morales, a documentary photographer, received the Photography award for the exhibition *Roll Down Like Water*, sponsored by the Center for Photographers of Color at the University of Arkansas. Morales is currently a candidate for an MFA in documentary expression at the Center for the Study of Southern Culture at the University of Mississippi, where she is also a producer at the Southern Documentary Project.
- **Deborah Wiles** from Tucker, Georgia, received the **Youth Literature** award for *Kent State*, written for students ages 12-18. She attended Jones County Junior College in Ellisville, Mississippi, and later received an MFA from Vermont College. *Kent State* provides extensive resources for student research.
- James S. Sclater received the Classical Music Composition award for *Angels*. This is his ninth award from MIAL. Born in Mobile, Sclater was on the faculty at Mississippi College for over forty years. Sclater often writes the texts for his vocal music, combining a love of music and poetry.
- Eddie S. Glaude won the Nonfiction award for his ninth book, *Begin Again: James Baldwin's America and Its Urgent Lessons for Our Own*. Born in Moss Point and raised in Pascagoula, Glaude received an MA and PhD in religion from Princeton University and currently serves as James S. McDonnell Distinguished University Professor and chair of African American Studies at Princeton.

- Catherine Pierce received the Poetry award for her collection *Danger Days*. Born in Wilmington, Delaware, Pierce has lived in Starkville, Mississippi, since 2007 where she is the co-director of the creative writing program at Mississippi State University. In April of 2021, Pierce was named Mississippi's Poet Laureate.
- Odie Lindsey received the Fiction award for his first novel, *Some Go Home*. Lindsey received a master's degree from the Center for the Study of Southern Culture at the University of Mississippi and is currently Writer-in-Residence at Vanderbilt University's department of Medicine, Health, and Society.

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• Steve Azar is the Contemporary Music Composition award recipient for *My Mississippi Reunion*. Born and raised in Greenville, Azar is a singer, songwriter, and record producer. He received a BS degree from Delta State University and lived and worked in Nashville for 18 years. Moving back to Greenville in 2011, Azar hosts a radio show and podcast "In a Mississippi Minute" and serves as artist-in-residence for Delta Music Institute at DSU.

- Rea Hederman received the 2021 Noel Polk Lifetime Achievement Award for his lifelong contributions to the literary world. Hederman has been publisher of the *New York Review of Books* since 1984.
- Cathy Hegman received the Visual Arts award for her show "Pandemic Perceptions." She lives in Holly Bluff where she maintains two full-time studios. Hegman started painting in 1984 while pursuing a BA degree in Interior Design at Mississippi State University. She is the first Mississippi native to receive a Gold Medal from the American Watercolor Society. She is represented in galleries around the world and her work can be found locally at Fischer Gallery in Jackson.

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Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters Award Nomination MIAL members are encouraged to make nominations to honor the artistic achievements of living Mississippians (current residents or former ones with continuing, significant ties to the state). Judges will consider only work shown, published, or performed in 2021. Members may nominate more than one individual in any category. Please make additional copies of this form if needed. Nominations should include a complete address or e-mail, if applicable. Cookbooks, edited works, and self-published works cannot be considered. All nominations are subject to board approval.

Only MIAL members may nominate

Award Categories:

FICTION (novel, short story collection, etc.)

LIFE WRITING (biography, autobiography, memoir, and travel writing)

NONFICTION (research-based books, including academic studies, popular history, and journalism)

POETRY Eligible are up to 15 poems published individually or in a collection (some poems in the collection may have been published earlier). Submit complete tear sheets or publication.

YOUTH LITERATURE (writing or illustration) Eligible are fiction or nonfiction works including picture books, chapter books, middle grade, and young adult.

MUSIC COMPOSITION—CLASSICAL (song, opera, composition, instrumental music, etc.) Submit evidence of initial performance or publication (MP3 preferred, but also book, CD, tape, score).

MUSIC COMPOSITION—CONTEMPORARY (blues, country music, jazz, rock, etc.) Submit the commercial recording. At least five original compositions must be presented.

PHOTOGRAPHY (color, black and white, combination) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual photographs. Submit CD, website link, slides, prints, or published work.

VISUAL ARTS (painting, sculpture, drawing, print, graphic arts, etc.) Eligible are thematic bodies of work, or up to 15 individual pieces. Submit CD, slides, prints, or published work.

Deadline: Nominations must be postmarked on or before **January 15, 2022**. Attach the artist's representative work (books, slides, photographs, CD's, etc.). Please send the nomination to the appropriate category chair listed below.

Those of you who regularly make nominations for MIAL awards will notice a new category on the nomination form: Life Writing. For many years we have been hearing our judges say the Nonfiction category was unwieldy. While acknowledging the quality of the books nominated, the wide scope made it difficult to judge, especially given the large number of books nominated in Nonfiction each year. Our thanks to category chair Ted Atkinson for defining and proposing a split into Nonfiction (journalism, popular history, and academic books) and Life Writing (biography, autobiography, memoir, travel writing, and personal essay/narratives). We feel this will make judging fairer and give more Mississippians the opportunity to be recognized for their scholarship and creativity. Dr. Atkinson has also agreed to chair both categories this year but will secure separate judges. We thank him for his service.
